Little did we know last March that when the Curating Team finished our Tuesday work it would be our last time meeting for some time. The new rugs were in place in our two freshly painted exhibit rooms and we were on a roll, giving a much needed cleaning to each piece before returning it to its spot on exhibit. Now it is three months later and we are still wondering when it will be safe to return and open our doors.

In preparation for that day, Marilyn Baader and Pat Kimber participated in a training session on re-opening requirements which was sponsored for libraries and museums by the Northern New York Library Conference. What we learned is that safety must always come first, and that means much more than a good cleaning before opening our doors. A written Safety Plan must be completed and approved by New York State in advance of opening—surfaces must be sterilized, volunteers must be trained, rules regarding admission must be communicated and expenses for masks and cleaning must be incurred—and even more! Once the requirements are lifted, we will need to first re-install exhibits in the two renovated rooms.

To respect safety first, the Board of Trustees will be evaluating our readiness and ability to re-open on a month-to-month basis. We fall into Phase 4; however, given the requirements and costs, we may look and operate differently than we have in the past. We have the best interests of our community and members in mind and will do what is right for you and the museum.

History Remembered

Remembering and celebrating history is the goal of all museums. Some museums focus on local, state, and national history. However, all history impacts our lives over generations. The significance of national holidays and special commemorative celebrations need reflection to understand our history.

<u>June 14</u>th – Flag Day became official with a proclamation by President Woodrow Wilson. However, it was the 2nd Continental Congress who approved a national flag on June 14, 1777. The stars and stripes and their colors all have significance.

<u>June 19</u>th – Juneteenth Day is the oldest nationally celebrated commemoration of the ending of slavery in the United States. It dates to 1865, when the Union soldiers, led by General Gordon Granger, landed at Galveston, Texas with news that the war had ended two years previous and that the enslaved were now free.

President Abraham Lincoln gave his **Emancipation Proclamation** in 1862 which announced that all slaves held in the states "then in rebellion against the United States, shall be then, thenceforward, and forever free." This took effect in 1863.

<u>The 13th Amendment</u> was passed on January 31, 1865 and was ratified by the States on December 6, 1865. The 13th amendment abolished slavery in the United States. Lincoln was assassinated on April 14, 1865 and never saw the ratification.

The 14th Amendment was ratified in 1868 granting citizenship to all persons born or naturalized in the United States – including former slaves – and guaranteed all citizens "equal protection of the laws."

The 15th Amendment was adopted in 1870 granting African-American men the right to vote. However discriminatory practices were used to prevent blacks from exercising their right to vote. It wasn't until The Voting Rights Act of 1965 that legal barriers were outlawed at the state and local levels. President Lyndon B. Johnson signed this into law on August 6, 1965 aimed to overcome legal barriers to vote.

The 19th Amendment was ratified on August 18, 1920 and officially adopted on August 26, 1920 giving women the right to vote. The substance of the current amendment was initially introduced in 1868.


THANK YOU, TOM!
